Please note that public meetings will not take place until further notice, due to COVID-19. Instead, the Council is holding 'virtual' meetings using Zoom. The monthly meeting is usually held at 6.00 pm on the second Monday of the month, and there is the same opportunity for members of the public to join the meeting as for open meetings; if you wish to do this please ask Julia (Clerk – as above) for a link to the meeting. The agenda is published on the website and the Notice Board, as usual.

In normal times, the Council meets on the second Monday of the month in the Thomas Hughes Memorial Hall, at 7.30pm. All residents are welcome to attend these meetings and raise any issues; we will make it easy for you by having an "open forum" session early in the meeting (normally 8.00 pm) at which issues may

be raised and discussed. The agenda is published on the Parish Council website and notice board at least three clear days before the meeting. We particularly welcome residents with planning applications that are to be considered at the meeting, to come and tell us about the application and explain any specific points which they may wish to make.

CO-VID 19 (Coronavirus)

The period since the Summer Courier was published in early July has continued to be dominated by the pandemic, with lockdown being relaxed, a little, from 23 July. Fortunately, that gave the Parish Council the opportunity to open the children's playground, albeit with some restrictions, and it has been good to see it being well used since then. A big thank you goes to Fenella and Mike on the Parish Council, for enabling this.



The Parish Council would like to thank again, publicly, all those who have continued to support the community throughout the pandemic, including:

- The UBW Support Group. This remains in existence, albeit largely dormant at present; should you need assistance you should contact the person who gave you their details at the start of the lockdown, Simon Jenkins or Mike Oldnall (see above), or the Vale District Council on 01235 422600
- Uffington Post Office and Stores
- Uffington Primary School – now open for the Autumn term
- The Fox and Hounds and White Horse Inn
- All those providing the essential services which many of us nowadays take for granted.

We would also like to thank all the children of the village for their attitude and behaviour throughout the lockdown period. There was great potential for the older children to become unruly and difficult as they tried to contain their natural energy, but this, to a very great extent, has not happened. Parents: Please pass this on, whilst accepting some of the credit for your guidance!

Facilities for Teenagers

It is not a secret that there are not many facilities in the village for the older children, apart from the MUGA for football, cricket and netball. The Parish Council is looking into this but conscious that entertaining this age group tends to be complex and expensive.

To make progress we need your help and seek adult and older children volunteers to collate ideas, assist with planning, consultation, project management and, crucially, fund raising as a proportion of the costs will need to come from external sources. So, if anybody sees this as a need and would like to help – individuals or a small group – please make yourself known by contacting any member of the Parish Council team, or join our monthly Zoom meeting Open Forum at 6:30pm to discuss your ideas.

As part of the planning approval for the development of Jacksmeadow, certain sums of money were required to be paid to the parish, district and county councils as contributions towards the additional infrastructure and facilities required to support additional residents. This is referred to as Section 106 Contributions. These facilities may be located within Uffington parish (e.g. Public Art) or further afield if shared (e.g. Secondary Schools or Swimming Pools). The Parish Council would hope to contribute to any eligible project with some funding from this source.

'Active Travel'

There was a lengthy section in the last Courier about this Government initiative in June, which led to us asking all residents to take up the following:

1. Parking. Please use car parks and driveways for parking, in order to get cars off public roads as much as possible, to make it safer for cycling and walking.
2. Footpaths. Some of the footways / pavements around the village are very narrow, (non-existent in some places), and some are made very much worse for pedestrians by overgrown hedges and verges restricting the pavement width. We would be grateful if those to whom this applies would please ensure any remaining overgrown hedges and verges are cut back to the property boundary by 31 October 2020 at the latest. Enforcement action may be taken after this date. If you need assistance please ask the Parish Council.
3. Cycling and walking to School. This is very much a School-led initiative, but we hope that as many children as possible will walk or cycle to school in Uffington; if cars are necessary, parents should use the village hall car park to off-load and then walk or cycle to School – it is only about 400m!

We also sent the following to Oxfordshire County Council as our ideas to reduce speeding:

20-mph speed limit. Introduce a 20-mph speed limit on the 'ring road' round the village, from Fernham Road junction at the Museum, via Woolstone Road, High St and Broad St back to the Museum.

10-mph speed limit. Introduce a 10-mph speed limit from the junction of The Green / White Horse to the end of the adopted highway on Lower Common.

Additional Physical Measures. Install physical measures to restrict speeding on the Fawler Road and Fernham Road approaches to the village. We would also very much like to see a resumption of the Speedwatch initiative to measure actual speeds on Uffington roads; Thames Valley Police approval to use the equipment held by a number of local villages was rescinded in April 2019.

We understand that these ideas have been accepted at local level, but to date they have not been examined for feasibility on the ground by Highways technicians, as Government funding for 'Active Travel' has been directed towards urban areas. We hope that our turn may come one day.

Uffington allotments

There are 28 plots available to tenants at the Uffington allotments, on the Fernham Road out of Uffington, and 24 of them are now occupied. The site has been very active throughout the summer, and the majority of the occupied plots are looking healthy and productive.

There are still a few spare plots which are available to all residents and also to others outside the village in the event of lack of internal demand. The terms are that you get an initial 12-month free period before the annual rent (currently £25 per annum) kicks in. (The free period is not on offer to non-residents of Uffington).

A letter to all constituents from David Johnston MP

I spent the parliamentary recess visiting as many individuals and organisations as I could. I met with the founders of innovative companies like Rosemor and Aquobex, whose cleaning and flooding solutions respectively attract custom from around the world. I visited hotels like the Bear and Milton Hill House, hotels being one of the sectors of the economy that has been particularly badly hit by lockdown, with some people being more reluctant to return to their previous way of life. At gyms like tfd Health and Fitness and Fitness Space people *are* keen to get back their previous way of life – and as a gym-goer myself I understand them! – they just have to book in advance and adhere to a higher standard of hygiene than perhaps they did previously. No bad thing, in my book.

At Farmer Gow's I saw not just what a great family day out the farm is for young and old, but also met the proprietors of successful businesses that Anne Gow has as tenants on the site, from LissieLou, the cake decoration business, to Bark and Berry Dog Grooming and the Oxford Yurt, a pretty impressive glamping site – I've never been glamping myself, but if you like doing so I'd check them out. I was pleased to make my first visit to the Westmill Wind and Solar Farm and delighted they were successful in their bid for Government funding for a new visitors' centre that will increase the number of visitors 6-fold.


Along the way there were lots of other independent businesses, like Didcot Glass and Glazing, Emma's Vintage Style, 30 Something and Bob's Butchers. Charities too, like Children Heard and Seen, which supports the children of prisoners – more on that in a future column. On my Facebook page (davidjohnston4wantage) you'll see I've started 'three questions' with the owners of different organisations to spread the word about organisations people might not have heard of.

On my week off, we went to the Lake District, but unfortunately I crocked my knee on a crag and am currently on crutches! It's my first real experience of having restricted mobility and it does bring home quite how many places are inaccessible for those who need to use crutches or a wheelchair to get around, something I've understood only theoretically before. Parliament is probably one of the worst examples, although I'm grateful I've temporarily been given an office nearer to the House of Commons to reduce the walking I have to do. Psychotherapist Carl Jung believed wounded healers develop insight and resilience from their experiences which enable the emergence of transformation to occur. African American philosopher, theologian, educator, and civil rights leader Howard Thurman (1900–1981) was a living example of such insight. In his poem, 'Upon Thy Altar', he reminds us with tenderness and compassion that one of the

most important aspects of healing *is the process of* offering our wounding to God:

Our little lives, our big problems—these we place upon Thy altar!

Brood over our spirits, Our Father,

Blow upon whatever dream

Thou hast for us

That there may glow once again upon our hearths

The light from Thy altar.

Pour out upon us whatever our spirits need of shock, of lift, of release

That we may find strength for these days—

Courage and hope for tomorrow.

In confidence we rest in Thy sustaining grace

Which makes possible triumph in defeat, gain in loss, and love in hate.

We rejoice this day to say:

Our little lives, our big problems—these we place upon Thy altar!

Take time with this poem, and use it as we go through this second wave of 'Covid times' together and separated. Remember to be kind and patient with one another, because that's the way God deals with us. We, in Oxford Diocese, are being called to focus on the 'three C's' regularly and to make our Churches places where these things abide; Contemplation, Compassion, and Courage – I think we're going to need all of them in spades! 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
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

We were delighted to learn that our apples had produced 186 x 750 cl bottles, (140 litres) of apple juice, pasteurised, bottled and labelled.

The apple juice is destined to raise money for St.Mary's Church and also for ACCESS, a small charity in Bangalore, India which we have been associated with for over 20 years.

The juice is now on sale at Norton House and Uffington Farmers Markets at £3 per bottle. Being pasteurized it will keep for up to a year, so would be an ideal addition to a Christmas hamper!


