Nether Stowey – Historic Quantock village

Set close to the beautiful Quantock hills, the historic village of Nether Stowey is the perfect base for walking, cycling and touring. There are plenty of places to stay, a tearoom, and pubs. There is an ancient castle mound and many impressive historic buildings. Here the poet Samuel Taylor Coleridge lived, enjoying walks with William Wordsworth that are now the route of the Coleridge Way.



Explore the village and its ancient castle

Coleridge moved into this simple cottage on the west side of the village in 1795 and lived here for almost 20 years. There is a small museum in the cottage, and the cottage is now a Grade II listed building.

The church tower is a Grade II listed building, and it is one of the most prominent features of the village. It was built in the 14th century and has a very distinctive design.

The castle mound is a large, circular earthwork feature that is believed to be the remains of a castle that was built in the 11th century. It is one of the most important archaeological sites in the village.

St Mary's Church is a Grade II listed building, and it is one of the most beautiful churches in the village. It was built in the 14th century and has a very distinctive design.

You'll love the Quantocks with their broad heathland, wooded combs, and spectacular views of the Bristol Channel. You can walk in the footsteps of Coleridge. Start at Coleridge Cottage, walk along Lime Street, up Castle Street, past the castle, and down to Watery Lane (follow the quill sign).



If you are lucky you may spot red deer. The Quantock Hills are a beautiful area, and they are a great place to walk. 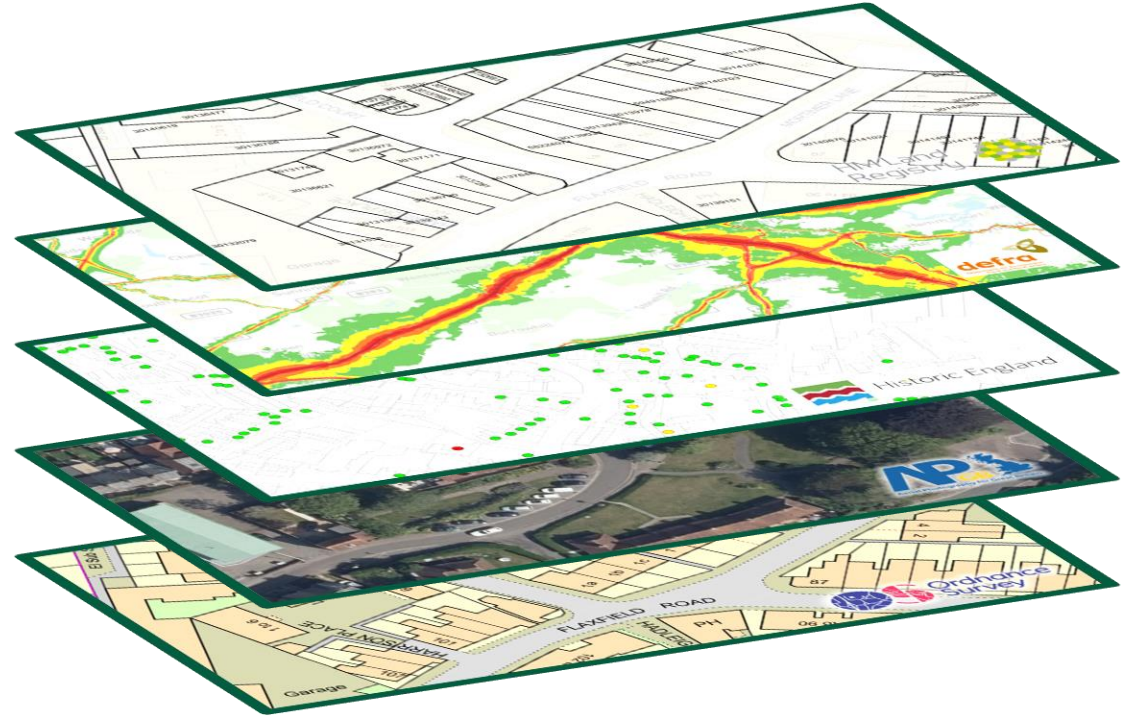

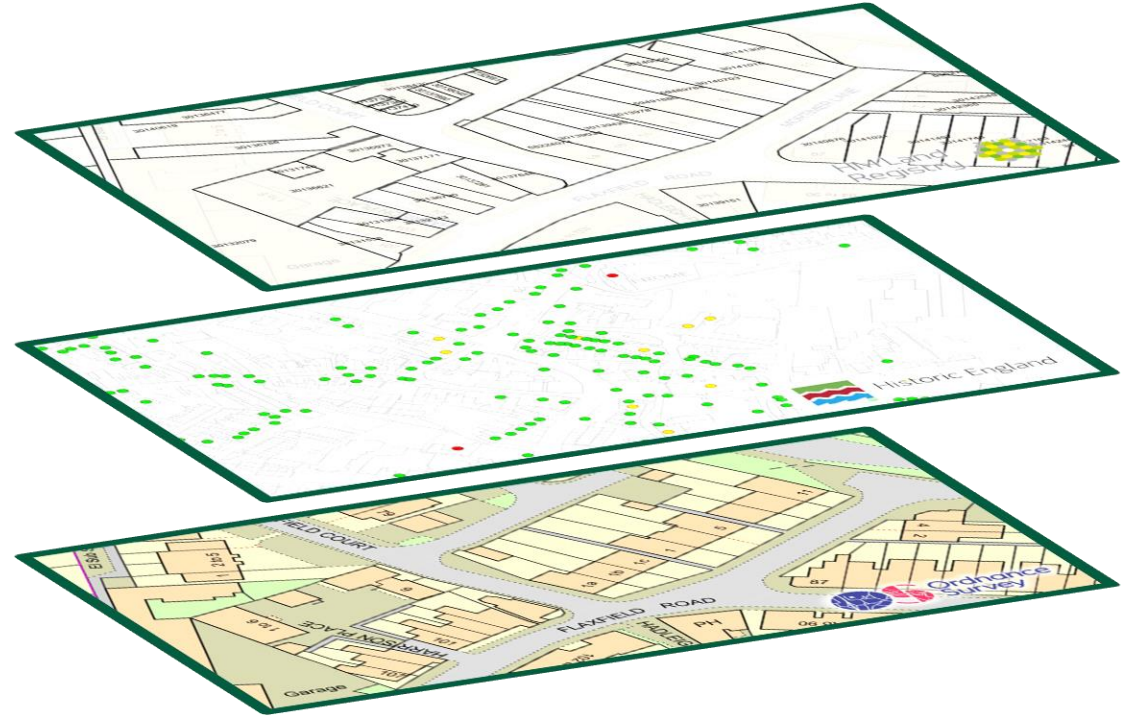

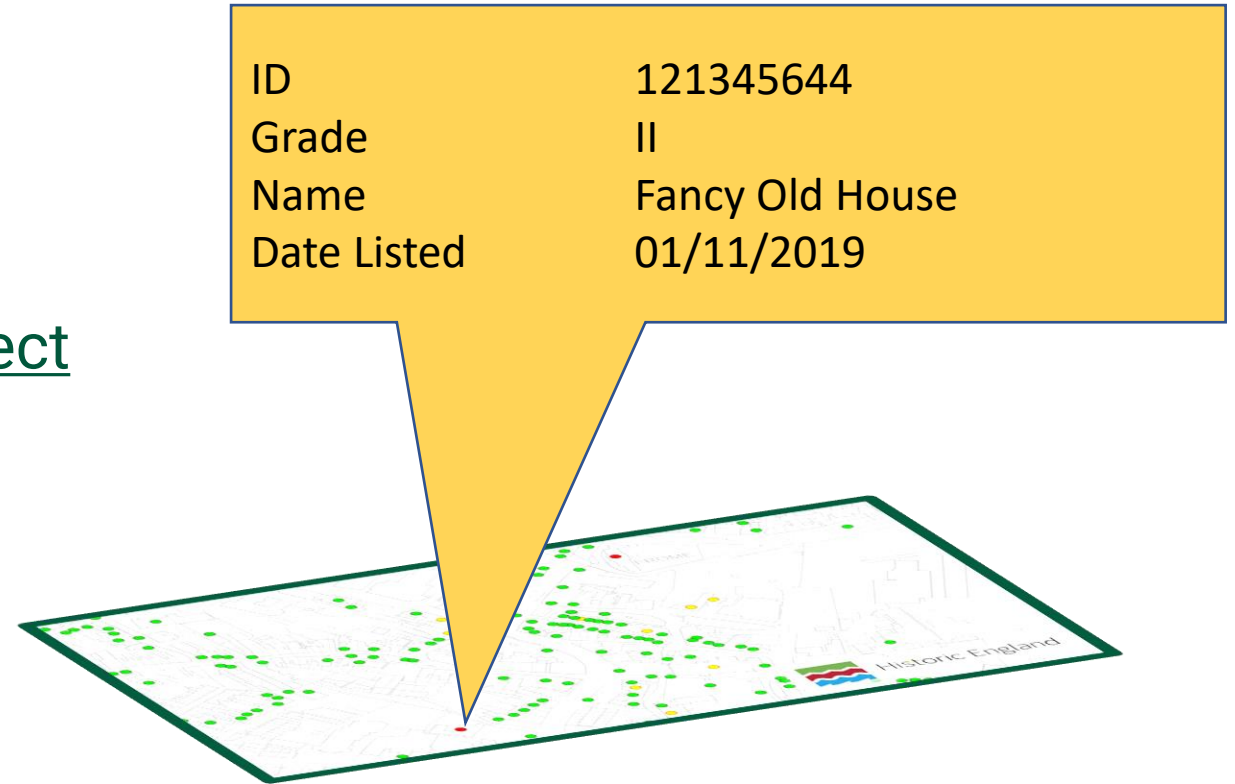

issue



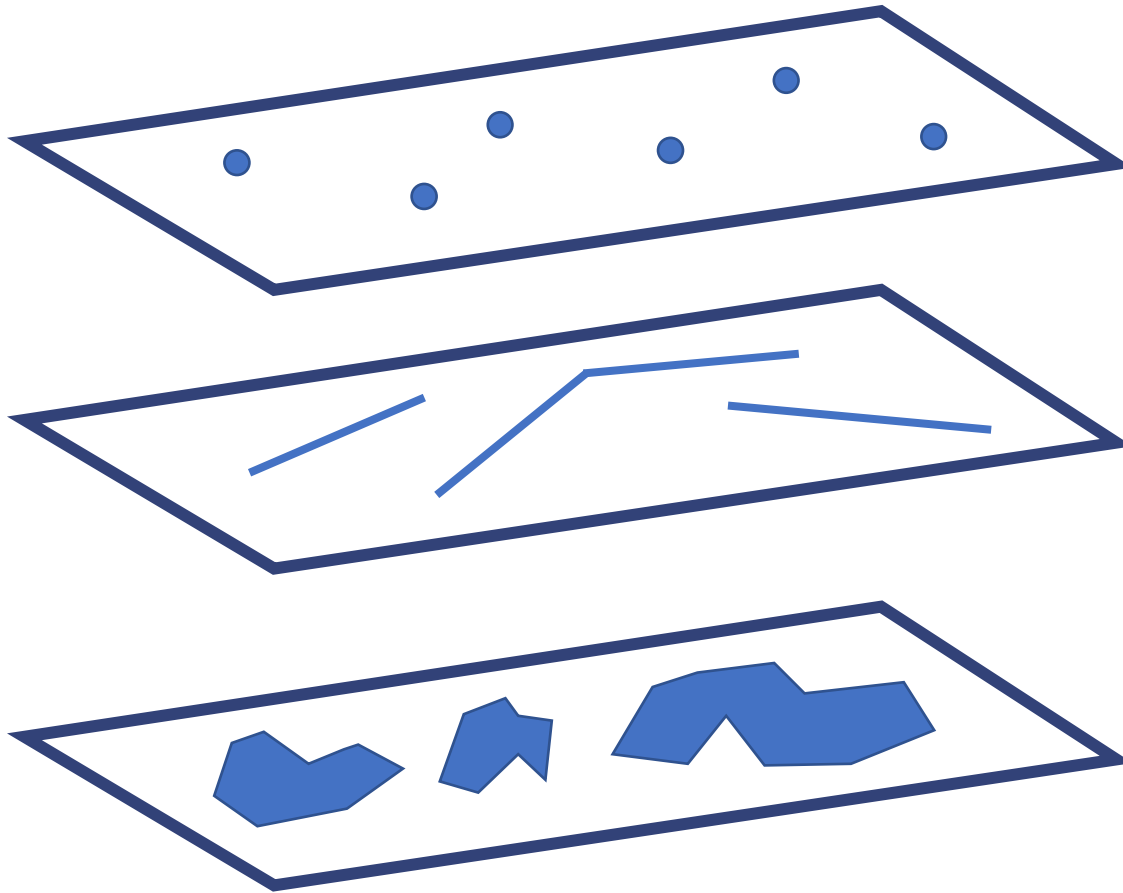
Most layers of information have

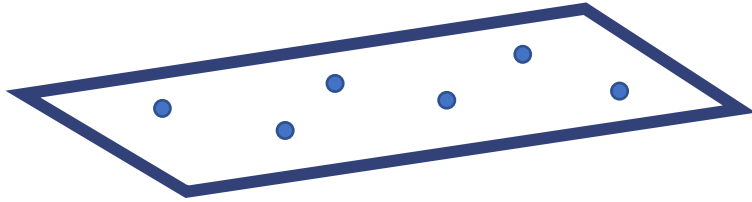
