Council Elections

At the May 2023 elections 5 councillors were appointed, 3 existing and 2 new, without an election as there were fewer nominations than the 7 vacancies. Subsequently, at the June Council meeting, one additional volunteer was co-opted as a councillor leaving just one vacancy. The names of the 6 councillors are on the inside cover of this issue of the Courier. If you are interested in becoming a councillor or helping the Council in any other way, please contact the <u>Clerk</u>.

Graham Banks - Valedictory: One of the councillors who stood down at the 2023 elections was Graham Banks – after more than 30 years' service on the Parish Council including a considerable period as Chairman. During his time as Chairman Graham worked hard and his achievements were many and varied and I would like to highlight some of the more recent ones with which many readers will be familiar.

- New Shop Graham and Helen Godsell worked hard with the lawyers to achieve an amendment of the Jubilee Field Trust Deed, in order that the present village shop might be built on its current site at the end of the car park. Keeping the shop was, and still is, vital to the wellbeing of the village and it took some doing to persuade Rose and Dave to stick with us through the prolonged negotiations.
- Jacksmeadow the biggest single development in the Village involved a great deal of negotiating to keep the number of houses down and the spacing between them up. Graham also negotiated the S106 money to be paid by the developer and which is still being spent on village projects.
- Allotments taking up the offer from the Avenell family to use the donated land for the Parish Allotments.
- Parish Burial Ground Graham took over the management when Sharon Smith left the village in 2015, with responsibility for over 100 graves, records etc
- Trustee and Treasurer of the Uffington Museum Trust.
- And who could forget the many Jubilee Field Tidies where Graham has been master of the bonfire!

Despite retiring from the Council, Graham continues to contribute to the village and is an active contributor and supporter of the church as the 'winder of the clock' and tidier of the graveyard. We all wish him well in his 'retirement'.

Parish Clerk - upcoming vacancy

After more than 7 years in the post, Julia, our Parish Clerk is moving onward and upward. Whilst this is good news for Julia it is not good news for the Council! The Council is therefore looking for a replacement clerk to take over at the end of September. The Person Specification for the post is as follows:

- 1. Previous relevant administrative experience.
- Competent user of Microsoft Office (365) suite of programs, especially Word and Excel.
- 3. After training, be able to operate the Council's chosen accounting software and Government VAT submission programs.
- To be CILCA qualified or prepared to achieve this qualification within 1 year of appointment.
- 5. Able to demonstrate a pro-active, flexible and problem-solving approach to tasks.
- 6. Good verbal and written communication skills, particularly the ability to communicate with audiences at different levels.
- Ability to work efficiently and under minimal supervision, organising and prioritising their own workload and taking personal responsibility for meeting deadlines.
- 8. Proven ability to work with tact and discretion, particularly as the Clerk deals with personal data and with people from different backgrounds with different needs.
- Demonstrable experience of working effectively with others, co-operating positively with colleagues and building productive relationships with other stakeholders.

The job is home-based and part-time (30 hours per month) and a laptop will be provided but the incumbent will need an internet connection. The salary will be based on the National Agreement on Salaries and Conditions of Service of Local Council Clerks in England and Wales. The starting salary will be approximately £13 per hour (depending on skill and experience) and which will be increased to approximately £15 per hour on satisfactory completion of the probationary period and achievement of the Certificate in Local Council Administration (which takes approximately a year).

Jubilee Field

Poplars. In the last edition of the Courier, we announced that the Parish Council had decided that the centre poplar only, at this time, should be removed. This work was carried out in early May. The general opinion following the felling, is that the area around the pond has been much improved by letting in more light. Some of the logs and chippings from the felled tree have been used to improve the path on the west (High Street) side of the pond making it much less muddy and, hopefully, stopping the bank sliding into the pond! The brambles etc around the site of the former poplar tree are to be removed and the area left

to settle for use as a wildlife area. The Council plans to continue to develop the area as a wildlife area as time and funds permit. If you have any ideas for this area please let the Council know.



Village Maintenance

Hedges and Ditches. The Council supported the 'No mow May' concept by leaving the hedges and verges uncut for as long as possible — except for junction splays where it would be dangerous to leave the verge uncut. The first cut of the village's verges has now taken place; the second cut and the hedge cutting will follow in the autumn, once the bird nesting period is over. If you need assistance with hedges, verges or ditches, or would like to join the maintenance group, please get in touch with the Parish Council <u>Clerk</u>.

Traffic Calming in Uffington

20 mph limit. Following the decision to go ahead and notifying OCC that Uffington wished to be made a 20mph village, the new signs and road markings were completed, ahead of the expected July date, in May. The electronic speed signs have also been adjusted to

show the new speed limits. Whilst the 20mph limit is very unlikely to be enforced by the police as was acknowledged in OCC's press release on 27th April, which stated: "While the council has been working alongside Thames Valley Police, the emphasis is on drivers adhering to the new limits through a change of mindset, rather than enforcement. It is hoped that as 20mph areas become more common, breaking the limit will become socially unacceptable for drivers." In order to encourage this mindset in Uffington the Speedwatch initiative (see below) will continue and the data from the electronic sign analysed to see if there are any noticeable changes in average speeds.

The Speedwatch group consists of 8 volunteers and there are now 9 sites in and around the village from which the group can operate. Since January, 27 drivers have been reported to Thames Valley Police for driving at speeds in excess of the speed limit — now 20 mph - within the village. Despite the publicity for the introduction of the 20 mph limit, new signs, the Speedwatch warning notices and the presence of a group of people on the side of the road in high vis jackets with something resembling a hair drier, there are still drivers travelling at speeds in excess of 40 mph.

So, more volunteers would allow more sessions, a greater deterrence factor and greater protection of other road users, including pedestrians; if you would like to help, please contact simon.jenkins@uffington.net

Allotments

The Uffington allotments continue to be busy and we are looking forward to the new growing season and all the challenges that will no doubt bring. The Parish Council has provided 2 more large water storage tanks spaced across the allotments for use by plot tenants to help to manage dry periods. The large majority of plots are now let, however a small number of plots remain available for rent by residents of Uffington, Baulking and Woolstone. These plots each measure roughly 100 square yards and are plots that mainly have not been worked before but offer great potential as a reward for the initial hard work that will be required. If you are a keen gardener who wants to enjoy the benefits both of healthy exercise and of growing their own fruit and vegetables, please contact either Barry Godsell (bandhg@hotmail.com) or Nigel Puddicombe (nigel.puddicombe@uffington.net), who will be happy to show you round on behalf of the Uffington Allotments Association and give you more details to help you choose the best way forward. The current annual rental is £25 per plot.

<u> Uffington Village Shop – Security Appeal</u>

Following the break-in in May, the following notice was circulated on 15 June 2023:

"Many of you will know the Village Shop was broken into in the early hours of 9 May and that it was not the first time it has been attacked. Sadly, this was a particularly nasty breakin.

This attack could not have occurred at a worse time as Rose and Dave Holborow are in the process of completing the sale of their house in Swindon and moving into the bungalow they have had built in Uffington. They have been looking to retire while ensuring the Shop continues to provide the service to our community it has done so well for so many years. This latest attack has certainly been a disaster for them.

The Shop was "back to normal" within a few days and some may think the term "disaster" is over dramatic. However, the cost to Rose and Dave of this attack, mentally and financially, will be considerable. Insurance may not cover the full cost of repairs and they will need to find funds to pay for improved security, such as a metal shutter for the main entrance to prevent yet another attack, and to be able to continue to insure the business.

The Shop is a lifeline for many people in the community, providing a range of services (prescription deliveries, dry cleaning, plants in season etc), in addition to selling food and

household materials. The Post Office, including banking facilities, is particularly valuable as banks and post offices continue to disappear from high streets. We should not forget the fact the Shop remained open throughout the covid pandemic and proved invaluable for those who could not leave the village. In short, there are incalculable social benefits to the residents of Uffington and other local villages in the continuing success of the Shop; the more we all use it, the better!

It is now known that the cost of installing a new front door (the current one was a temporary stop-gap to get the business opened again) and metal shutters to improve security will be in the region of £5,000. There is obviously a need to get these repairs completed as quickly as possible. It is thought that there are many people in Uffington and surrounding villages who would wish to show their appreciation of Dave and Rose's work for us over many years by contributing to the repairs. We are therefore setting up an 'Appeal Fund' to raise funds and to show Rose and Dave that their long-term support to our community is much appreciated.

The Appeal will be open for 2 weeks only from today, and the names of those who contributed will be passed to Dave and Rose, unless contributions are made anonymously.

For accounting and audit transparency reasons, Uffington Parish Council is running the project and seeking to raise the necessary funds, both through this appeal and via other grant-making bodies, as we feel it essential that Rose and Dave should be able to complete the work in the shortest possible time, almost certainly before the insurance claim has been processed. It is therefore difficult to know what the final sum required will amount to. However, the Parish Council is willing to ensure that the total cost of repairs and new shutters is available immediately, even if part of this is a loan until the insurance company has paid up.

Please consider donating as generously as possible, to help Rose and Dave get back on their feet and allow the Shop to continue providing a much-appreciated service to our community."

Outcome

There was a rapid and extraordinarily generous response to this appeal, which raised over £5,000 by 30 June **and is now closed**. These donations enabled the Parish Council, working closely with Dave and Rose, to place an order for a new front door (complete with frame) and steel roller shutters, both of which were installed on 11 July. At the time of

writing, the Council is considering with Dave and Rose what further security enhancements might be worth installing with any remaining cash.

Dave and Rose are extremely grateful to all those who have made this improvement to the security of the shop; the names of all those who contributed will be given to them shortly.

In April the Hall said goodbye and a big 'Thank You' to Ray Avenell, who has kept our finances straight for many years, chasing late payments and making sure we were never overcharged. It is thanks to the diligence and attention to detail of Ray that we have a comfortable bank balance and have been able to keep hire charges the same for the last five years.

We welcome Jonathan DeWilton as our new Treasurer and, we now have a modest-sized management team and a full complement of Trustees, which means the overall administration of the building is under control. However, impressions can be deceptive and while things are running well currently, it is very apparent we have lost much of the "support team" of people who, in the past, were available to carry out the wide range of maintenance jobs needed to keep the hall building in good condition. These jobs range from regular checking for problems to general maintenance and repair of the equipment in and the fabric of the building.

The need for volunteers to help maintain the building has been mentioned in several issues of the Courier as well as in the weekly newsletter but people have busy lives today and availability of volunteers may now be a thing of the past. We will continue to look for help from within the community but we may have to allocate funds to bring in contract help for general maintenance.

Changes to the hire charges is something we would wish to avoid; so if possible and if there is anyone in the three villages who could help us to avoid this by volunteering their time to carry out routine maintenance activities, please get in contact with me or one of the committee members and trustees.

A VISIT TO COLESHILL

The Friends of Uffington Museum were treated to an insightful 'Behind the Scenes' tour at the National Trust's Coleshill Model Farm on June 7th, hosted by Sarah Hannis from the National Trust and by their guide, Liza Dibble, who herself is experienced organic farmer.

Liza began by explaining that Coleshill was an exemplar farm formerly owned by the Earl of Radnor, that made use of the natural slope of the hillside along with the latest technology and best agricultural practices of the day. The harvested grain would have been stored in the rickyard in neat rows of thatched 'ricks' sat on limestone staddle stones to keep them off the damp ground and away from vermin. Liza then took us to the threshing barn sat high on the slope of the farm. To the front of the barn was a small brick outbuilding that once housed a steam engine to run the machinery inside. The barn has been sympathetically restored, retaining a magnificent collared queen-post truss roof with an octagonal lantern at its centre.

Another mechanical innovation was the use of tram carts. The track ran below the barn so that bags of grain and feed could be lowered through trap doors above to the awaiting carts and, with the help of gravity, the feed could be efficiently distributed around the farm.

The courtyard, formerly the poultry yard, is a real sun-trap - especially on the day we arrived. Low level animal sheds that enclose the yard have also been restored and retain their unusual 'rattrap' brick pattern and wooden fresh air louvres and skylights, so that even on the hot day when were there, they were unexpectedly light and airy inside. The original animal pens, which are surprisingly large, have also thankfully been saved but they now contain exhibits and information about the former Coleshill Country House built by Sir Roger Pratt, but sadly demolished after a fire in 1952.



The courtyard is a great open space and is a regular venue for the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings (SPAB) which runs lime plastering workshops. Many of the outbuildings have been repurposed as a Heritage Skills Centre that promotes and supports traditional crafts and skills which is so important today as so many are now under threat of being lost.

The Friends were shown the workshops of some of their resident craftspeople including blacksmithing, stain glass and heddle loom weaving. One workshop we visited was that of Tom Ball, a professional wood and stone carver. Tom's work has included the restoration of 17th century wood carvings from Trinity College Oxford that were made by the celebrated artist, Grinling Gibbons.

Coleshill also supports local community enterprises such as the Highworth Community Shed, it brings people together that may also be suffering from mental illness or loneliness as well as being a great place to learn new skills such as wood turning.

THE SAUNDERS TRUST

Readers may like to look out for a procession which takes place in Uffington on Thursday 20th July. This annual event honours the educational philanthropy of a long-ago local landowner. Thomas Saunders was a wealthy gentleman from Woolstone who founded the original Uffington School for 12 boys in 1617. The Saunders Trust was founded in 1644 by his son, also called Thomas Saunders. He endowed the school with land and a house to provide in perpetuity for a schoolmaster. The schoolroom is now Tom Brown's Museum. In 2017, the 400th year since the founding of the school, the Saunders Trust commissioned a memorial plaque which is mounted on the wall of the museum.

The Trust nowadays exists to provide financial help to some pupils at Uffington School for educational trips and other necessities. The Trust also presents dictionaries for the Year 6 pupils at a Founders Day Service at the end of the school year. The children go in procession from school to the Old Schoolroom (now Museum) to give thanks to Thomas Saunders for founding the original school and to lay flowers on his grave in Uffington Church. This is followed by a presentation in the church to those pupils who will be leaving.

The Saunders Trust is a registered charity and is managed by representatives from Uffington and Woolstone; chaired by the Vicar. We spend the interest on the capital, to continue to support children into the future at Uffington School.

The Founders Day Service is one that is long remembered by those children who take part in it and it is hoped that this will continue for many years to come. The trustees would be grateful for any donations given after the service on Founders Day in the envelopes provided. Everyone is welcome to the service, which starts at 11am,

A heartfelt message from local school-children

FROM UFFINGTON VICARAGE

It is hard to believe we are half-way through the year, and yet plenty has been happening recently.

In these secular times it is good to know that people still wish their loved ones to be buried in the churchyard. I have been helping people inter ashes recently - of George Smith in Uffington, where nearly 30 people came to the interment. They called themselves, rather tongue-in-cheek, the 'Graveyard Committee', since at the end of April each year, on the anniversary of a much-loved grandmother's death, they gather in the churchyard and afterwards at a local hostelry to celebrate lives long-lived and their own kinship.

I am glad people still do this. Funerals are one of the few occasions, like marriages, that we take the chance to gather as friends and family to celebrate all that we are, and the ties of blood and love which bind us.

The medieval church often talked about the 'Cloud of Witnesses' which refers to the Church over time. I sometimes tell people to look outside their church, at the gravestones which surround it, and see their lives in much wider terms; supported by many more than simply those whom they know and love who are alive.

It is in this wider context of trust and love that we have remembered recently and will continue to remember Bob Iles, Graeme Clark, Edward Seymour, Elizabeth Rosser, Margaret Gantlett and Stefan Plant. All of these folk were more loved than it is possible for any single individual to be conscious of, and we thank God for each one of them and their unique gifts as well as foibles.

It is encouraging to me that, despite living in an increasingly sceptical Western world, people still wish to be confirmed in the C of E. I type this on the eve of a Confirmation service in St Andrew's Shrivenham at which six people of a variety of ages were be confirmed by the new(ish) Bishop of Dorchester, Gavin Collins. Three of these come from our Benefice, and I took them through an all-too-quick course (which I hope to improve on in future).

My faith in human nature, as many of you know, is amply increased by drinking tea and eating cake with people! We had great opportunity for that, and for viewing some lovely gardens, on June 11th at the Uffington Gardens Open Day, Dog Show and Games. My sincere thanks to all who came and to all who helped.

Hope to see you at something soon and never feel matters of faith are off the table! It is to make the startling discovery that they are not just about ensuring we have a proper idea of God, but about how we learn that we are the focus of an eternally trustworthy, unchanging love, and how we begin to live in the light of such knowledge.' 
Now that warmth and sunshine has finally arrived, we have produce sprouting all around us at the garden. The purple sprouting kept going for ages but is now off the menu. Once we stopped eating it, we uncovered them, so that the lovely yellow flowers can be enjoyed by bees and any passing butterfly can lay eggs on the leaves for their caterpillars' food.

This year's brassicas will be well covered when they go in the ground but in the meantime, our struggling butterflies need a helping hand! Our re-sown broad beans are tender and delicious and the inevitable blackfly hasn't affected the yield and will soon be eaten by the ladybirds and lacewings. There has been evidence of saw fly on the gooseberries this year but since we no longer net our fruit, the birds must have had

a feast – as they're all gone now and left plenty of fruit for us too. Sparrows and blue tits in particular, need plenty of caterpillars to feed their young so don't be in a rush to try to eliminate them. Working in harmony with nature means more of everything to go around and it's such a joy to be in a buzzing, thriving garden on a beautiful summer's day.
