Jubilee Field

Poplars. In the last edition of the Courier, we announced that the centre poplar only, would be removed and that the work was carried out in early May. The general opinion following the felling, is that the area around the pond has been much improved by letting in more light and the Council is now planning how best to improve the area further and a suggestion has been received that we should remove as many of the bramble roots etc as possible and level the site further and turn it into a glade with a bench and woodland wildflowers. Any further ideas from villagers would be welcome.

Following the felling of the poplar and as might be expected, a larger than usual number of shoots had been appearing for some 10-15m around the stump. Professional advice is that we should keep cutting off shoots as they emerge and cut the stump down to ground level (to get closer to the roots) and to insert lots of 'eco-plugs' (which do not allow the chemicals to enter the surrounding ground) to gradually kill the stump off.

Field Tidy - the next Jubilee Field tidy will take place on 28-29 October (29th reserve day). Please come along and help prepare the Field for winter.

Speedwatch

The Speedwatch group consists of eight volunteers and there are now nine sites in and around the village from which the group can operate. Since January, **41 drivers have been reported to Thames Valley Police** for driving at speeds in excess of the speed limit – now legally 20 mph - within the village. Despite the publicity for the introduction of the 20 mph limit, new signs, the Speedwatch warning notices and the presence of a group of people on the side of the road in high vis jackets with something resembling a hair drier, there are still drivers travelling at speeds in excess of 40 mph.

So, more volunteers would allow more sessions, a greater deterrence factor and greater protection of other road users, including pedestrians; if you would like to help, please contact <u>simon.jenkins@uffington.net</u>

Parish Council Grants

The Council budgets for a limited amount of money each year to provide grants for village organisations. Subject to funds being available and suitably justified, the Council is committed to providing assistance and support to local groups which are set up to promote and improve community life for local residents. The Council will look more favourably on organisations/causes located in Uffington whose activities are provided for the general benefit of residents in Uffington, rather than elsewhere (for which a more limited sum is reserved for making donations).

Applications should be submitted by 30 October each year to be considered for payment by 30 March the following year or inclusion in the following year's budget. Full details are contained in the Grants and Donations Policy which is available on the <u>website</u> along with the application form. The Clerk or any member of the Council is available to assist with completing the form if help is required.

Village Maintenance

Hedges and Ditches. The Council has continued to minimise its ecological impact by leaving the hedges and verges uncut for as long as possible – except for junction splays where it would be dangerous to leave the verge uncut. Hopefully the second and last verge and hedge cutting will follow shortly this autumn. If you need assistance with your hedges, verges or ditches, or would like to join the maintenance group, please get in touch with the Parish Council <u>Clerk</u> and see the longer Village Maintenance article elsewhere in this magazine.

<u>Allotments</u>



The Uffington allotments continue to be busy and the large majority of plots are now let. However a small number of plots (or half plots) remain available for rent by residents of Uffington, Baulking and Woolstone. These plots each measure roughly 100 square yards and are plots that mainly have not been worked before but offer great potential as a reward for initial hard work. If you are a keen gardener or wish merely to enjoy the benefits of healthy exercise and growing your own fruit and vegetables, please contact either Barry Godsell (bandhg@hotmail.com) or Nigel Puddicombe (nigel.puddicombe@uffington.net), who will be happy to show you round and give you more details.

The annual rental is £25 per full plot. At the September meeting the Council voted not to increase allotment rents for 2023/24. Invoices for 2023/24 will be sent out at the end of September and it would be appreciated if payment could be made promptly.

VILLAGE MAINTENANCE



From time to time, all organisations reach a point in which one generation needs to hand on to the next. That situation now applies to the routine maintenance of land owned by Uffington Parish Council ('the Council'), including the verges and ditches around the Jubilee Field and at the allotments. Failure to maintain these areas reflects badly on the village and the image it presents to residents and visitors as well as increasing the risks to villagers, especially children.

The Council coordinates a group of volunteers (sometimes known as the 'Barmy Army'), a small number of whom can be relied on to turn out to assist with one-off problems. The bigger issues are the trimming of the verges around the Jubilee Field (2 or 3 times between spring and autumn, in between the cuts by the Council's contractor) and the annual clearance of the ditches around the Jubilee Field, to mitigate risks of flooding elsewhere in the village. At the allotments, during the growing season, the grass strips between plots need regular mowing, and the water butts owned by tenants need to be topped up regularly, especially during the drier periods.

These tasks have been undertaken on a voluntary basis in recent years mainly by Barry Godsell and Simon Jenkins. Whist neither are quite in their dotage yet, both feel that with the impact of advancing years their physical ability to continue can no longer be guaranteed, meaning that proper provision should be made for the future. The work they do has been costed recently and it has been calculated that the saving to the Council of these maintenance tasks at the allotments and around the village being carried out by them as volunteers amounts to around £2,500 a year.

The Council is therefore seeking new volunteers who are willing to commit to regular and reliable contributions of their time to take over, gradually, these tasks. Anybody interested is encouraged to speak to any of Barry Godsell, Nigel Puddicombe or Simon Jenkins; if you are unable to contact them directly, please send a note to the Parish Clerk, at email: <u>clerk@uffington.net</u> Note that responses are required by 1 November.

Should there not be a meaningful response to this article, the Council will be investigating employing external individuals or contractors. To pay for this, the Council's budget will have to rise accordingly which would mean an increase in the overall Council Tax paid by all residents of Uffington.


NOTICE OF ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

RIDING & STRIDING FOR THE CHURCH & CLOCK Jeremy Moss



Fundraising for the repair of the Clock is going well: £15,000 has been received towards our target of £24,000. This is a great achievement from our local community and has been achieved through direct fundraising and the generosity of our donors. It represents many more people donating than just those who make up our weekly congregation. A great effort, warranting a very big thank you.

The work includes the repair of damage suffered due to wear and tear/breakdown; and then the automation of the rewinding mechanism (\pounds 7,580) that we have been so fortunate to have done manually by parishioners over the years - most recently by Graham Banks.

There is no doubt that support for maintaining the clock reaches right across our community. Next steps are to appeal to trusts - both local and regional - for further funds to complete the exercise. Our immediate focus is on Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust for reason shown below.

Local efforts continue and none more so than a super effort on 'Ride & Stride' day by Juliet Moss and Jeremy Goulston in sweltering conditions, doing sponsored cycle rides on behalf of OHCT.

Juliet visited two churches early in the morning before changing and singing in a choir at a wedding in Pusey. Then after a quick sandwich she took to her bike again at 1.45 and cycled round a further 15 churches between Shrivenham and Pusey: a total of 17 churches and 40 miles. Jeremy, our vicar, cycled round four churches with his two girls in the trolley behind; another impressive effort in heat of 32 degrees. Jeremy was also impressed by those from other churches in the Benefice; including John McCullough, the Campbells and Cuan Ryan, who were also helping to raise money for their churches that day.



UPGRADING UFFINGTON FOOTPATHS – FINAL PHASE Simon Jenkins

Footpath 4 (FP 4) is used by many people for walking in a northerly direction from the village towards Moor Mill Farm, and on to Fernham, Baulking or Shellingford, or returning in an extended loop to the village via Uffington Gorse (Uffington Fox Covert) and the kissing gates on FP 12. FP 4 is accessed from a passage behind the 'Cottage on the Green' after which it crosses a small paddock initially, followed by a number of larger fields in agricultural usage, a wooden footbridge over the disused Wilts and Berks Canal, and an elevated footbridge over the railway before reaching Moor Mill Farm.

Fifteen new galvanized gates (a mixture of kissing and self-closing gates) were installed by the Council in July 2023 to replace stiles on FP 4. This was the fourth in a series of projects by the Council to improve access to the footpaths in and around Uffington for walkers of all ages. This article provides a project record and some pictures of 'before and after'. The map below shows the footpath with the locations of the 15 new gates:



The project was funded by a number of donors, to all of whom Uffington Parish Council is very grateful; they are (with the amounts):

Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment (TOE) with funds from Grundon Waste Management Ltd, from their own funds and through the Landfill Communities Fund	£3,486.00

The old stiles having been replaced by kissing gates, or, in some cases, simple self-closing gates, and the ground around the new gates improved, more people can use FP 4, and everyone will have a safer experience. The footpath is now easy to access and walkable by people of all ages. Starting close to the centre of the village, near the village shop, this is excellent for community involvement and therefore beneficial for the health and well-being of our residents.

NEW PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT FOR JUBILEE FIELD Kat Foxhall



After the arrival of our new football goal this summer – already being well used – the Parish Council are pleased to share plans for two large pieces of play equipment for the Jubilee Field.

The existing 40-year-old swings at the south end of the field will be replaced by a new triple swing set, made up of two standard swings and a basket swing suitable also for children with disabilities. We are also planning to install a new spacenet climbing feature which we hope older children will enjoy.

The new equipment will be funded mostly from the remaining developer contributions from Jacksmeadow.

A particular thank you to the children and parents who have taken the time to contact the Parish Council and our local MP, about the play equipment they would like to have in the village.

A TROUBLED PARISH: Uffington 1670 to 1690

A number of significant events occurred in England during the middle of the seventeenth century, not least the English Civil War (1642-1651), the restoration of the monarchy (1660) and the plague (1665).

The turmoil created by these events persisted into the latter part of the century and affected every walk of life in every corner of the realm. There is no reason to assume that the parish of Uffington and its people were not affected and to this extent might be considered typical of a rural community in this region. Some insight into this community may be gleaned from St Mary's Church 'Presentments'.

The 'Presentments' were replies to a questionnaire circulated by the bishop and included crimes such as⁽¹⁾: '.. adultery, whoredom, incest, swearing, ribaldry and drunkenness, schism, defending papist or any other erroneous doctrine, causing a disturbance in church, failing to take Easter communion (being over the age of sixteen) not attending Church on Sundays or Holy Days and not having a child baptised'. Churchwardens were in many respects the 'enforcers' of the church.

Presentments submitted on 15th April 1672, by Richard Rushley and John Reynolds, churchwardens of Uffington, included the following⁽¹⁾, '...we hereby inform that the ffanatickes heartofore excommunicated & imprisoned for their manifest obstinacy, contumely & non-conformity to the Civil & Ecclesiastical lawes are lately released out of Reading Gaol'.

Unfortunately, the identities of the 'ffanatickes' have been lost as a consequence of a fire in the records office during the 19th century. However, the majority of nonconformists were thought to be Quakers, reportedly being the strongest group within the parish at this time.

A married couple, Richard Thatcher (b.1645) and his wife Jane (née Stevens, married March 1667), were cited in a damning 1671 Presentment for failing to baptise their daughter. In 1682 they left England and emigrated to North America, thus following the example set in the 1630s when large numbers of persecuted non-conformist English men and women sought religious freedom in the New World.

A little over 350 years later, Jean and her husband Earl Yager, currently living in southern California, visited England for the first time; Jean is a descendant of Richard and Jane Thatcher. By prior arrangement with Uffington Museum's curator they were able to visit the museum to explore its archive, especially that relating to the Thatcher family dating from the 1600s to the present day.

UFFINGTON CRICKET CLUB - 2023 Season Joe Parman

After the surprise successes in both League and Cup competitions last season, this season's campaign turned out to be far more challenging. A run to the semifinal of the cup was welcome relief from spending the season in the lower reaches of the league.

It all came down to the 18th and final game of the season with three teams including ourselves vying to avoid the last relegation spot. Despite winning the final two league matches - the last a nail-biting one-wicket victory - it wasn't enough to save us as we finished just one point behind 8th place and three points behind 7th.

The rather unpredictable weather throughout the season was no help, and at times it felt as if we didn't have bad luck we'd have no luck at all. But ultimately we were a number of times authors of our own downfall by too often not scoring enough runs to put the opposition under enough pressure.

Hassan (18 wickets), Mat Hazell (16 wickets) and Pete Jones (14 wickets) also made it into the top 20 wicket-takers for the season. Dan and Pete also made the top 10 individual scores list, both with high scores of 87, and Arik Pujari-Powell made it into the top 15 individual bowling performances with 5-26 in his debut match for the club.

We fared better in the Wednesday night T20 league, losing only two of our eight games to finish in 2nd place - the highlight being chasing down 171 in just over 17 overs against Chilton Foliat.

Despite the disappointment of relegation, it was still a really enjoyable season involving lots of laughter - we never gave up or lost heart and can't wait for next season to come around. We are a small club and getting 11 players out every week isn't always easy. We only used 20 players all season (every other team in the division used no fewer than 28) so there is a game for everyone who wants one!
