Uffington Parish Website

Current Website. The Uffington Parish website (www.uffington.net) has been in its current form for almost 10 years. The website includes general village information and the mandatory information which the Parish Council is required to publish. The website general information about Uffington and the surrounding area includes information such as:

- Links to other websites (OCC, VOWHDC, SSE, Thames Water etc).
- Information on the village (maps, walks, etc).
- Information on village organisations, clubs and societies.
- Basic information about the Village Hall, Church, Museum, White Horse Show, Community Garden (all of which have links to their own websites).
- Local business advertisers (free with paid-for Courier adverts).

The Council is legally required to meet an updated (November 2024) accessibility standard which cannot be met by the current website structure and host company. As a result of this requirement the Parish Council has decided to create a separate new website for only Parish Council information with a host that can meet the latest accessibility standard. At the same time the uffington.net address will be changed to uffingtonpc.oxon.gov.uk as recommended by the internal auditor.

Future Village Website. Based on access information (hits), the majority of the current website is rarely accessed. A show of hands at the recent Annual Assembly showed that few knew of the website and even fewer ever used it! As a result, the Parish Council is considering retiring the non-council parts of the website (although this would be available until the end of the current contract) and then shutting it down completely if usage continues to be minimal.

Jubilee Field

After a winter with so much rain, the Jubilee Field was been often flooded in places, and extremely wet underfoot. Thankfully, with the very dry Spring months, it has now dried out, and the Council has been able to continue with some of the planned improvements.

Picnic Table. By popular request, another picnic table has been installed near the new play items. The table and benches are made from a recycled plastic material which should last considerably longer than the softwood table purchased previously. The table is also wheelchair accessible.

Pond/Poplar Area. We had hoped to sow grass and wildflower seeds on this southern side of the pond but the dry weather has meant that the seeds would not have germinated and so this work has been postponed until later in the year.

Willow Arbour.

Despite the dry weather, the small willow arbour is doing well encouraged with occasional bucketsful of water from the pond. As the willow continues to grow we continue to weave the new growth it between the original stalks to thicken up the cover.

EASY RIDING Adam Ruck

One after another, the grim-faced cyclists stream past me as I pedal along at my leisurely pace, enjoying the air and birdsong. They remind me of pilgrims making their way up the aisle on all fours, thrashing themselves as they go. What exciting sins have these people been enjoying, that need such furious expiation? Where are the slow cyclists like me, who go out on a bike to enjoy our beautiful countryside because cycling is less effort than walking?


'You just don't meet them,' helpful family member points out, 'because they're going the same speed as you. There can't be many that go slower.' That's true. I can't remember when I last overtook another cyclist. This encouraging thought prompts me to suggest a few circuits that might appeal to easy riders who are new to cycling or our neighbourhood. Quiet country roads ideally suited to our purpose are not hard to find. Among them I don't count the Icknield Way (B4507), which must be one of the least bike-friendly roads in the kingdom, with its tortuous switchbacks, steep banks and motorists in a hurry. Cycling groups love it, inexplicably. These routes start and finish outside Uffington's peerless Village Stores and Post Office, its shelves piled high with fuel for the cyclist.

Circuit 1: Uffington, Knighton, Compton Beauchamp, Longcot, Fernham, Uffington. 11 miles – about an hour. 200 feet of ascent. The only uphill bit is the short climb to the hamlet of Knighton. If you do the circuit in the reverse direction, the climb from Compton Beauchamp is steeper.

To enjoy: after a nod to the noble facade of Compton Beauchamp House, dismount for the little church of St Swithun, with its delightful mural paintings and a touching memorial to Mary Cooper, 'a truly good and faithfull servant' who died in 1762 after 45 years in the service of Anne Richards, the last 20 as her housekeeper. Test the accuracy of your milometer by measuring it against the 18th century milestones – one on the verge at Compton Beauchamp, the next semi-hidden in the hedge a mile further on (towards Shrivenham), just before a footpath crossing.

Watch out for: suicidal white doves on the road in Fernham; cars on the wrong side of the often flooded corner on the run down to Uffington; ducks crossing (with or without apostrophe) below the village.

Pit-stops: King & Queen, Longcot, said to be on the up; Woodman, Fernham (not Monday); Fox & Hounds, Uffington (of course).




Circuit 2: Uffington, Little Coxwell, Great Coxwell, Coleshill, Fresden, Shrivenham, Uffington. 17 miles, 700 feet of ascent. About 90 mins.

I realise the ups and downs balance out, but this circuit seems much harder work if done clockwise, because of the climbs through Coleshill and up Badbury Hill.

To enjoy: Great Coxwell, the Great Barn.

Watch out for: the A420 crossing is an obvious hazard, followed by nettles, brambles and metal slalom posts on the cut-through path from the bus stop. Beyond the Great Barn the road surface is awful. The bridge over the Cole on B4000 north of Shrivenham is narrow and bumpy: caution required, tempting though it is to approach at top speed for momentum on the other side.

Pit-stops: Eagle, Little Coxwell – top choice for a proper Sunday lunch (needs booking); Radnor Arms, Coleshill – garden seating, decent pub grub available every day (although the website suggests otherwise); Prince of Wales, Shrivenham; Bloomfield's Deli & Café, Shrivenham; Fox & Hounds, Uffington (natch)



Circuit 3: Uffington, Baulking, Kingston Lisle, Westcot, Sparsholt, Sparsholt Firs, Seven Barrows, Kingston Lisle, Uffington. 17 miles, 850 feet of ascent. About 1 hr 40 mins.

Each half of this figure-of-eight configuration can be reversed, so multiple changes can be rung. Unlike the other circuits described, this one involves a climb to the Ridgeway. My preference is to go up to Kingston Lisle from Baulking, and up to the Ridgeway from Sparsholt, a beautiful little road (at least until it tilts skywards in earnest). The long freewheel through the gallops towards Lambourn is ample reward for the uphill slog. Unfortunately, a short section of the dreaded B4507, between the Kingston Lisle and Westcot turnings, is unavoidable unless you push your bike along the footpath that skirts the north side of the Lonsdale Estate.





Watch out: good brakes required at the bottom of Blowingstone Hill (crossroads) and on the descent from Kingston Lisle to Fawler (dangerous driveway exit).

Pit-stops: Blowing Stone, Kingston Lisle (lunch at weekends only); Fox & Hounds, Uffington (not Monday).

We were delighted and grateful to participate in the White Horse Garden Club plant sale and open gardens recently. As well as raising funds, it is a great way of welcoming people to the garden and even inviting them to come and join us too. We do *not* have pristine lawns and immaculate herbaceous borders but what we *do* have is a an organic, wildlife and people-friendly, working-community garden, growing healthy fruit veg and flowers in harmony with the natural world.

Knowing your environment helps you to value and protect it better, so we invited the Moth Recorder for Wiltshire to visit the garden to discover what we have lurking in the undergrowth, come nightfall. Local teenagers and Ridgeway class from school came along; a trap was set for identification and safe release next morning. WOW! What a marvellous array of moths; from tiny to massive, with some perfectly mimicking a broken twig. This is just one of the bonuses of leaving beautiful swathes of long grass on site to set seed as a perfect, but now quite rare, resource for wildlife. We have enjoyed identifying the many native grasses

too, with rustic old-fashioned names such as Mouse Barley, Meadow Foxtail and Yorkshire Fog.

Early in June, we were thrilled to host all four classes from Uffington Primary School as part of their learning about 'Sustainability'. We covered Food, Biodiversity, Soil and Water Conservation; having fun in the compost bays and discovering how to keep our little bit of the planet happy.

Oh, and we also grow stuff to eat and share – currently potatoes, beans, onions, shallots, garlic, tomatoes, cucumbers, melon, squashes, courgettes, peas, cauliflowers, sprouts, aubergines, all manner of fruit and herbs and flowers ... along with a fine crop of caterpillars, snails, birds... Come and see! Even better – come and join us!

To become a volunteer at the garden, membership is FREE so just come along. It is situated behind the Fox & Hounds; parking in Patrick's Orchard - Saturdays 2-4pm. AUSTEN CONNECTION AT MUSEUM

This year's exhibition – 'Pride & Patronage' – celebrates the 250th anniversary of the birth of Jane Austen and her connections to the Vale of White Horse. We have welcomed over 300 visitors already and hope to see many more including those who live locally. The museum is a village asset, with the building owned by the Parish Council, run entirely by volunteers – please support us by visiting and bring your friends and family.

Nicola Cornick, a local author and historian gave a talk in the Thomas Hughes Memorial Hall on Monday 30th June. She will spoke about the Craven family and how they inspired Jane Austen.

The museum continues to exhibit the history and archaeology of the area including the White Horse and Wayland's Smithy. We have permanent displays on Thomas Hughes and Tom Brown's School Days and also the period that the late Poet Laureate Sir John Betjeman lived in the village. We have a mock Victorian Schoolroom and continue to record the changes in village life in Uffington, with nearly half the collection consisting of photographs and articles from the late 1800's to the present day.

In July we will welcome all the pupils of Uffington School to celebrate Founder's Day and Thomas Saunders, who founded the original school in 1617. Uffington Museum will be open 2pm to 5pm every Saturday, Sunday and Bank Holiday from Easter until the end of October and entry is FREE. We have local merchandise for sale and donations are always welcome to keep the museum up and running. You can visit us at the Uffington Farmers Market; the wonderful White Horse in steel art is available to purchase – it makes an excellent gift. Please don't miss the opportunity to visit this 'little gem' of a museum and see the Jane Austen exhibition.

FROM THE VICARAGE

A lot has been going on in St Mary's recently. This ancient building is still seeing its fair share of weddings and funerals (not a few of these recently). Hence our call for more 'Assistant Vergers' (see below); feel free to speak to me about that ancient word, which is very similar to being a 'Sidesperson'. Such people can help our building be a mid-wife to the presence of God for others. If that sounds a bit grand, it may be as simple as giving someone a cup of tea and a slice of cake. A big thanks to all who are helping at teas this season, and particularly to James W (for the perseverance) and Simon N (for the technical know-how) in getting the internet, and therefore other things like a card reader, into Church.

I once heard it said that the Celtic Christians had a prayer for everything, even milking a cow. They knew, too, about the thinness which separates life from death. Celtic spirituality has, as poet John O'Donohue wrote, a refined sense of the miracle of death. 'For a Celt, the eternal world was so close to the natural world that death was not seen as a terribly destructive or threatening event'. Death in our modern world is often kept hidden and out of sight. Technological advancement and the increasingly disembodied lives we lead push death further away.

There's a common misconception that Christianity is only concerned with spiritual matters – the things we can't see. However theology over the centuries has highlighted that we are neither just material, nor are we just spirit. The rituals the church has honed over millennia to help us deal with the things of life and death place importance on the body too.

'Ashes to ashes, dust to dust' we say – a return to the earth out of which God formed us. Christian hopes centre on Christ's triumph over death, but also in being 'fully alive' as Augustine put it.

This is not to diminish our bodies, and those we have loved whilst they were living, but it is also to provide a glimmer of hope about what is to come too. As O'Donohue wrote; 'Celts are comforted that they are going home to where no shadow, pain or darkness can ever touch you again'.

But for now we have this life, this reality, these relationships to work with – it may be as simple as a cup of tea with a friend, a neighbour, or just yourself. As I said on Trinity Sunday, one is never alone if you accept that God is relational too. The Nicene Creed, 1700 years old this year, is but a verbal form of a much deeper reality about the one who made us. May we always be enabled to experience such things, especially over as something simple as a cuppa.


