Parish Council

Opening of the new Post Office and Stores

The move of the Post Office and shop to its new premises at the Jubilee Field is now really close, with the 30th January 2014 scheduled as the opening date. This project has involved a huge amount of work from the Holborows and I'm sure you would all join me in thanking Dave and Rose for the commitment they have shown to the Village.

Proposed housing development off Station Road

Since the last edition of the Courier came out there has not been much news to report regarding the proposed development. The District Council's planning department have been examining the plans and the comments submitted during the consultation period. They have discussed the plans with various specialists and the Developers (Redcliffe Homes), who agreed to an extension in the time the District Council has to consider the application. These discussions may result in revised plans, but we have had no news of this as of today's date (02 January 2014).

Precept for 2014-15

The precept is the part of your council tax bill that comes to the Parish Council. This pays for regular expenditure (like the upkeep of the Jubilee Field and Burial Ground) and contributes towards one-off costs (e.g. the creation of the new allotments). For the year starting April 2014 the precept will rise to £13,989 (from £12,717), a rise of approximately £4 per year for each household in the Village.

Village photocopier

The photocopier in the School is run by the Parish Council. It is available for local businesses and community groups to use (e.g. for producing flyers or newsletters). The current black and white copier is now being replaced by a colour copier, so should be even more useful. [top](#)**News from your District Council.**

This has been a very busy period with planning being the big issue at the District and budget 'cuts' at the County Council.

Planning at the District is still waiting for the county-wide report on SHMA, which will set the housing requirements for the next 15 years for each of the districts in Oxfordshire. Early hopes of a full report in December have been put back by Government's requirement to relate housing to expected economic growth. We still hope for the county-wide report in January so that the Vale can proceed to the second stage of its consultation on the new Local Plan for VWHDC. Meanwhile speculative applications are being made by developers aware that until we have our new Local Plan inspected and adopted the Vale planners must reflect the requirements of the new NPPF (the national planning framework) to permit all housing that is 'sustainable' and contributes to the Vale's housing land supply, or risk losing on appeal with costs awarded against the Council. With permissions already granted the Vale is now able to demonstrate a 4½ year housing land supply, but has to reach a 6 year supply because we are so far behind after years of delivering too few houses.

Currently we are expecting housing development along the A420 to reach somewhere near 2,000 new houses by 2029. Proposals known so far suggest new housing developments of about 400 in Shrivenham; 400 in Watchfield; 400 in Faringdon; and 400 in Kingston Bagpuize with permission granted mid-December for 200 houses between Great Coxwell/Faringdon. These houses won't all be built together, but combined with 8,000 intended for the eastern villages of Swindon, the demand for increased infrastructure is becoming a priority. We will need schools and road capacity and health services to cope with thousands of new residents, and I am pressing for the developers to make proper contributions to these new requirements. We can't demand all we would seek from the developers because they are required to deliver 40% of their developments as 'affordable housing', which is a sensible priority.

At the County Council I have been pressing the case for attention for the A420 at every

opportunity. It has been decided to draw up a new Local Transport Plan to take account of housing developments not predicted when the last plan (LTP3) was adopted in 2011. I made sure to be a member of the new working group for LTP4, and was elected to chair that group, which ensures that the western villages are given proper attention.

The Western Vale Villages Consortium (WVVC) commissioned an independent traffic report early in 2013, which has been demanding attention from both Swindon Borough Council and Oxfordshire County Council. A meeting is fixed in early January between the technical experts of both authorities to examine that report. I will be there to chair that exchange and hope to see some agreement on the priorities before the first big planning application for 2380 houses at South Marston goes before Swindon's planners. We are all indebted to the WVVC for timely work which has now won serious attention.

So it's been busy and your interests are presented at every opportunity!

The County Council is facing budget reductions totalling £274m in the next 4 years, which is a challenge not met before. The first stage reduced spend by about £214m, and I have witnessed the work to find the additional £60m savings in the budget for next year. I am impressed by the thorough work of the officers to find innovative ways of delivering services and with new-found efficiency. It may well be that the County finds it will deliver more for less, which is the challenge Government is setting all public spending.

Delivery of all County services will continue to be monitored by formalised Locality Meetings of the County Councillors and officers for a wide area. I am to chair the Wantage and Faringdon Locality Meeting, and at our January meeting we expect reports on the maintenance of the roads, S.106 agreements (developer contributions), schools performance, and attendance at day centres for the elderly, as well as Network Rail's declared plans for electrification of the local network, especially bridges and road closures. I will let you know how we are doing in my next report. Happy New Year to you all!

The most important event in the village will be the opening of the new shop. As I write it is becoming a thing certain at last, so its time to celebrate a bit and appreciate the extra ordinary service we get from Rose and David. This picture was taken at the Vale's Community Awards lunch at end of October when they received their Award for their outstanding care and attention for the village. They provide the 'heart' of the village; every service possible is

delivered by them (I remember being so impressed how my mum's repeat prescriptions were organised by the shop) and the effort they will make to get all we ask for is well known and well used. And of course the shop is where we meet, and connect and see unexpected people and stay in touch and life in the village would not be the same without them. So I nominated them for a Community Award for their very special service to us all, and hope you will also celebrate their achievement in getting this new shop planned, permitted, funded, designed, built, and stocked (we hope!) every stage was difficult, and they have been remarkable; resilient and determined and somehow optimistic they would make it happen. Behind the scenes there have been more delays and challenges than any project deserves, but Rose and David soldiered on with a little (actually a lot) of help from their friends and the building is a triumph of commitment and courage and dogged determination I have admired and now want to celebrate. This is a real achievement, which serves us all, and we send thanks to them for this very special service in our village.

Best wishes for 2014. We'll have a great new shop to enjoy!

Rosanna has now returned to full duties as our Priest in Charge after her sabbatical during September to December.

At a special service in Christ Church Cathedral on 2nd November, Beryl Packer was licensed by the Bishop of Dorchester as a Licensed Lay Minister (LLM). 61 parishioners from the 4 churches in the benefice packed into a coach to attend the service, after which a lunch for over 80 guests was held in St. Mary's.

We were greatly saddened at the death in December of the Reverend Canon Jim Payne, after a short illness. Jim served as Curate and as the senior member of the Uffington Benefice Ministry Team, after retiring from nearly 30 years in full-time ministry with his wife, Dorothy, in Lagos, Nigeria. His funeral in Shellingford on 10th December was well attended.

The Friends of St. Mary's are raising funds for the complete refurbishment of the priest's room, over the main porch, which has been lying derelict for many years. The room will be fully insulated and heated, and could be used for small meetings. It was fully re-roofed two years ago as a first step towards its reinstatement. Our Architect has drawn up provisional plans for approval by the Diocesan Advisory Committee. The plan shows access to the room from the organ loft, which will avoid the problem of resurrecting the collapsed spiral stone stairway.
